American Alligator




During heavy rainfall in the summer of 2012, this **American Alligator** was observed in our park's south storage area. It measured close to eight feet in length and was captured and removed by the County.

The American Alligator is one of the largest reptiles in the world. Males can attain 19 feet in length while females are somewhat smaller on average. Their bodies are covered with horny plates which protect them from predators; and their eyes, ears and nostrils are located on top of their heads allowing them to function mostly submerged in water. They have valves on their ears and nostrils which they can close allowing them to stay under water for up to 60 minutes. With tails approximately half the length of their bodies and 80 teeth housed in strong jaws, they are formidable in capturing and killing their prey.

Alligators feed mostly on fish, birds, snakes, turtles and small mammals. They feed mostly at night. They often drown their prey but must surface to eat it because they cannot swallow underwater. They cannot chew and therefore swallow their meal whole or in large chunks. They can go for weeks without eating during the winter months.

Mating season is April through May and they breed in open water. After conception and constructing a nest, the female will lay 30-70 eggs. She will cover them with a mound of vegetation which incubates the eggs. The temperature inside the mound determines sex – more warmth produces more males. After typically nine weeks, hatching occurs, the mother breaks open the nest and leads them to water. The young will stay with the mother for 18 months until she hatches the next year's litter.

Habitat for Humanity has terminated its remote can recycling program due to lack of manpower/volunteers and liability issues. Connie Garrison contacted the Habitat office in Venice, and they agreed that if we would eliminate their logos from the cottages, Habitat would give the cottages to RCR homeowners and we could keep them in place and continue recycling aluminum cans. (*If you have volunteered before, your name is in the data base*)
- 3. **The Volunteer Hours Report by Activity**. Leaders, please submit this report at the conclusion of the activity. For activities that take place in March or April, or those activities which do not end until March or April, leaders must submit the report form by March 1. Please make sure your information is **complete** when submitted. (I will get the form to you close to the time of your activity.)

A Volunteer and Informational meeting is scheduled monthly. At that time the upcoming month's calendar is reviewed and Lori Lilly, our Activity Director, presents information regarding activities and expectations. Any volunteer requests are brought forward at the meeting, and questions/comments related to volunteers and activities are welcome.

Looking forward to another fun-filled and entertaining season. You, the volunteers, will help to make it happen.

At an October meeting with Carla Easton, our manager, it was mutually agreed upon that the guidelines created last season for the Volunteer Luncheon will continue.

Volunteer Luncheon Requirements:

Meet the Manager

The hospitality industry, just like other businesses, has periodic management changes. That is the case for Royal Coachman. After several years of good work, Jason was promoted and we now have a new park manager, Carla Easton. I thought that it would be a good idea to use the Macaw to introduce her to the residents.

She has been with Equity Lifestyle Properties (ELS) since 2003, first working in accounting and then quickly moving into management and has worked at a number of ELS properties in Florida. Prior to arriving at Royal Coachman she was the manager at Ramblers Rest RV Campground in Venice.

Ms. Easton was raised in a military family, living at a number of locations around the U. S. and when a U. S. Army recruiter visited her high school in 1987 she decided to join the Army. With a specialty in finance she spent eight years in the military at a series of Army posts located in Germany and Panama.

Prior to being selected by ELS to manage Royal Coachman she had just the basic knowledge of Royal Coachman being in the Encore system. Do not take that as a disinterest in Royal Coachman. Park managers have more than enough to do taking care of their own parks to be very interested in someone else's problems. She stated that her first impression of Royal Coachman is that it is a beautiful park. She be-



lieves that there is a uniqueness in every park and is currently in the learning phase to fully understand how this particular park is best operated. Ms. Easton said that she has an open door policy and any time park residents are in the front office and her door is open you are welcome to stop in.

Square Dancing at RCR

During the 2012/2013 season, a small group from RCR went for square dance lessons at Woodmere Park. It was great fun and the group decided it would be even better if square dancing could be taught in RCR. In 2013, by working with Lori Lilly, the group was able to arrange the use of park facilities for the 2013/2014 season and the park manager agreed to pay for the first lesson. This allowed people to try dancing without a commitment to determine if they liked it. Lessons after that were paid for by residents at \$5 a week per person. Up to sixty people followed up with lessons for the year and all



seemed to have a great time. The first 2015 square dancing session will be offered in the Rec Hall again this season on Jan 3, 2015, from 12 pm to 2 pm for those with some square dance experience. Subsequent sessions will be in either the rec hall or the pavilion as weather and schedule permit. A beginning class will also be offered in the rec hall Jan 5, 2015, from 2 pm to 4 pm. The price remains at \$5 per lesson. Details and signup sheets are posted in the library. If you are interested, please come and try square dancing. After the first three classes, registration will be closed so that the classes are not constantly starting over.

We learn dance steps, make many mistakes and do not strive for perfection. We wear street clothing not costumes. The social interaction and the exercise make it fun. Our caller, Red Bates, is a very experienced and patient person; he adds lots of dry humor to the events.

You may come as a couple or an individual. Individuals will be paired with partners. We hope you will try at least one of the first three lessons. After that, we think you will be hooked.





